### **MESSAGE TO PARENTS**

Church Camping is a unique opportunity for youth (and adults) to have fun together, learn and grow together in an intentional Christian Community, religious education setting, and outdoor environment.

Included in all camping programs are Bible Studies, worship and learning experiences, and outdoor activities.

This year the theme is "God Is Here" a study of the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed.

Please review the summer camp activities as a family. Select the type of programs which are of interest to you. Not all the programs have the same activities. Note in the schedule the appropriate grade (this is the grade entering in the Fall).

Campers live in hogans, a tent on a platform, or the winterized retreat houses. Three well-rounded meals are served daily in the dining hall. A snack is provided in the evening.

The camp staff is composed of committed and well-prepared college age group leaders, camping pastors, supervisory staff, adult volunteers, program specialists, and support staff.

### Registration and Payment Fees

The registration fee must accompany the application. Please do not send cash. Check or money order preferred. The fee for all programs include curriculum and arts and crafts materials.

### Insurance

All campers are covered by health and accident insurance from Mutual Security Life Insurance Company. The terms and conditions of the coverage are available upon request. Medical services are available 24 hours a day. The staff is trained in First Aid.

### Camperships

Many congregations/groups provide camperships for their youth. Please contact your pastor or leader for details or the LOMC office for procedure. Regardless who provides the campership or the amount, the registration fee *must* accompany the application.

### Health Certificate

Health certificate forms will be sent to each camper when registrations are confirmed. Forms should be filled out and completed by the family physician and returned to the LOMC office one week before camp.


### High School Trip Camps


