- 6. a diplomat en route to an emergency meeting of the Nation Security Council.

Family Musical Mixer. Ten chairs (more or less, depending on size of group) are placed at random around the playing area. Ladies (if present) are asked to sit in the chairs. A man is asked to stand behind each chair. To the right of each man stands another man and to the left stands another lady. Another guest sits on the lap of the lady in the chair. The lady in the chair becomes the mother, the person in her lap is the baby, the man behind the chair is the father, the male to his right is the son and the female to his left is the daughter. Each is given a card indicating his role and surname: "mother Smith," "father Smith," "son Smith," "daughter Smith," and "baby Smith." The group around each chair will be given a different surname--a different set of cards for each group. While music plays all participants have a brief period to move around playing area exchanging their cards with other players. At the same time, the leader removes one or more chairs. When music stops, everyone hurries to get reorganized around a chair with his new family. Anyone not finding a chair may be eliminated, turn in their cards and become spectators along with other members of their new family.

Suggestions: One set of family cards should be prepared in advance for each chair. Size of crowd will determine number of chairs. Where participants are well-acquainted, actual family names may be used. When new families organize, there should be some time to get acquainted, perhaps with the leader giving a topic for discussion (for example, "discuss your favorite desserts").

This is a traditional Scotch party game learned from C. Stewart Smith, a Scots folk dancer at the Stockton (California) Folk Dance Camp.

Most of these mixers are directed toward large groups. Small groups can get acquainted faster, get into informal games quicker, and do not require as much of this type of activity. There are many singing games and folk dances which may also be used as mixers:


